

Only God Knows What You Will Become

I grew up in my grandmother's home, where positive affirmations were few and far between. Instead, I was often met with sharp words that left lasting impressions. She frequently told me I wouldn't amount to much. I vividly remember being around 12 or 13 years old when, after doing a poor job cleaning the kitchen, she called me "trifling," one of her favorite words, and added that no one would ever hire me to clean their house. Even at that young age, I had a quiet confidence in God's purpose for my life. I muttered under my breath, "I don't plan on cleaning anybody's house but my own."

Looking back, I don't believe my grandmother said those things out of malice. In her own way, I believe she loved me deeply and thought her words would push me to be better. It was her version of tough love. Still, we now understand that there's a fine line between tough and harmful. Despite her well-meaning intentions, her words planted seeds of doubt and chipped away at my self-worth.

Though I grew up in the church, my teen years were filled with mistakes and missteps. It wasn't until I was 21, while singing in the University of Toledo's Gospel Choir, that I made the life-changing decision to fully commit my life to Jesus Christ. That decision marked a turning point, redirecting my path toward God's divine plan.

As a young single mother, I faced many challenges. At one point, I considered dropping out of college for a full-time job offering a \$15,000 annual salary. It felt like the responsible choice at the time. But my father stepped in with words of wisdom I'll never forget: "Tosha, if you finish that degree, you'll be turning down jobs like that for better ones that pay much more." His encouragement kept me focused. I turned down the job, stayed in school, and eventually earned my Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, an achievement that marked just the beginning of my journey. Nearly three decades later, I look back with gratitude for the challenges that shaped me. With almost 30 years of experience in education, I've had the privilege of serving in various roles within Chicago Public Schools, including Assistant Principal, Principal, Network Deputy Chief, and Chief of Schools. Each of these positions deepened my understanding of how school systems function and fueled my passion for creating transformative learning environments.

Over the years, I've remained committed to equity, student success, and faith-informed leadership. I earned a Master of Arts in Counseling from Oral Roberts University and a Master of Education in Educational Leadership from Lewis University. I recently completed my Doctor of Education (Ed.D.)

in Educational Leadership at National Louis University.

Today, I serve as the Head of Schools at Daystar Academy, a Christian, International Baccalaureate (IB) World School in Chicago's South Loop, where we serve students from Pre-K through 12th grade. In this role, I'm honored to bring together my professional expertise, personal faith, and unwavering belief that every child deserves access to an excellent and nurturing education. My mission is clear: to lead with love, serve with purpose, and help others, especially young people, see that their story isn't defined by where they start, but by who they choose to become.



July is... National Minority Mental Health Awareness

Minority mental health awareness month is a national observance that raises awareness of the challenges that affect the mental health of people in racial and ethnic minority groups. Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, act, handle stress, relate to others, and make choices. We know that people of all ethnicities and cultures experience mental health conditions and that black individuals experience mental health challenges at rates similar to other groups. However, when considering the mental health of black Americans, it's important to look at the historical and cultural factors, some of which have led to significant disparities. "Disparity is defined as a difference in level or treatment, a lack of equality or similarity, especially one that is seen as unfair." Be it historically or culturally, black Americans have an understandable mistrust in the medical and mental health systems. Black people are far less likely to seek care. Statistics tell us that about 25% of African Americans seek mental health treatment, compared to 40% of white Americans. When members of the black community do seek mental healthcare, they are more likely to receive it from an emergency department than from a mental health specialist. All too often, our healthcare system fails to adequately address mental health struggles of minority populations. Failure to provide access to mental health facilities, failure to properly screen and provide appropriate referrals and resources continues to plague the minority community.

Culturally responsive mental health treatment is one way of addressing the disparities in psychological well-being in the black community. As we continue to learn and educate others, let's use this month to raise awareness of the challenges that we face as a people and community.
